From Forbes:

- Expect complications
- 2. Become a mentor as much as a parent
- 3. Keep your own anxieties at bay
- 4. Talk about hopes and goals, not just colleges

- 6. Listen to your school's counselor, not your neighbors (sidenote: I say use all resources!)

Some Harsh Realities

- For the colleges performing "holistic reviews", there is no guarantee for anyone
- Colleges have budgets and run out of money, and sometimes begin denying qualified applicants, or offering no money
- Admission decisions can be very confusing
- Universities have annual "agendas" or strategic plans that are not usually public knowledge
- If the college is tracking demonstrated interest, this is usually a very subjective data point
- Selective universities do not have to provide financial incentives – the "reward" is being admitted
- There are colleges who invite students to apply and then deny them

First Step → Graduate ©

- "We just received a letter about missing graduation requirements, what does it mean?"
- Don't panic!
 - Lists all requirements and what your student still needs to earn by May
 - Should not be a surprise –created with your student in Jan!
 - Most seniors need 1.0 English and 2.0 electives
- Contact your student's counselor (Mrs. Spraggins, Mrs. Lange (Mrs. Tretter), Mr. Hussmann, Mrs. Greenwood)
 - Questions
 - Special circumstances
 - Correspondence courses

How Many Applications?

- Reach school credentials may meet or are below published admission standards. (All "highly selective" schools should be considered a reach school for every student.)
- Target school credentials are in published range
- Academic safety credentials definitely meet or exceed published standards for the school
- Financial safety school is an academic safety and meets your financial situation
- If you are planning appropriately, you should not need to apply to more than 7-8 schools.

Early Decision, Early Action, Priority, Regular Decision, Oh My!

Biggest question... "Which one means I have to go if I'm accepted?"

EARLY DECISION

"Is there benefit of applying one way over the others?"

EARLY ACTION/PRIORITY

"Can I apply ED and then if I don't get in, submit the rest of my applications RD?"

Who's Most Organized?

- Not always your 17-18 year old...
- Build a list of requirements and deadlines together, and then help them stay on track
- What is in the control of your household?
 - Completing and submitting the actual application
 - Sending official test scores
 - Requesting transcripts, forms, and recommendation letters
 - Providing friendly reminders to those letter writers ©

How is the transcript evaluated?

- Courses taken
- GPA earned
 - Only shows weighted GPA
 - Our scale is 4.0
 - We do not report or calculate unweighted GPA
 - But...some colleges recalculate GPA (core and/or unweighted)
- Level of rigor
- We do NOT rank, nor can we determine rank
 - o out of o

How do we request/send transcripts?

- Step 2: Use the handout on the <u>Senior class</u> page to walk you through the steps
- All requests must be submitted through Naviance (formerly known as Family Connection)
 - Tip: must be in the <u>student</u> Naviance account, not the parent account!


What is Naviance?

- Comprehensive college-readiness tool
 - Research colleges, view historical acceptance data, see college rep visit schedule, view scholarship opportunities, request transcripts, request recommendation letters, fill out counselor survey, and more!
- Students have been using since middle school
- Parent accounts available, but many have not activated
- If you do not have an active account, and would like one, just send me an email!

(If you can't remember your password, I can also do an auto-reset)

What does self-reported transcript mean?

- This means that they do not need to send an initial transcript with the application
- All courses/grades taken in high school are typed directly into the application
- The college makes a decision based on what was reported
- If admitted and they decide to attend, the final transcript must be official from PCH
- Tip: Print the unofficial transcript from Infinite Campus and use it to enter coursework

How do we send test scores?

Self-reported scores?

- Type scores into application; submit official if you matriculate to that campus
- Scores submitted with high school transcript?
 - Mark to include when requesting transcript (entire test card is sent)
- Directly from testing agency?
 - Log into ACT and pay \$13 to send to each school (☺)
 - Takes 2-3 weeks to deliver!!!!
- Know what the college needs (ACT or ACT with writing, SAT Subject Tests)

Which scores do we send?

- Writing/No Writing
- Highest composite
- Superscore
 - Send the test date with the highest English
 - Send the test date with the highest Math
 - Send the test date with the highest Reading
 - Send the test date with the highest Science
 - Send the test date with the highest Writing

Example

Highest composite → send test 3 or 4

ACT w/ Writing Required → send test 4

Superscore \rightarrow send test 3, 4 & 5 \rightarrow (23+26+26+27)/4 = 25.5 = 26!

What if a school is test optional?

- If your GPA/transcript alone makes you competitive for admission, but your test score is below average for their institution, you do not need to send a test score.
- And it's ok!
- Some do require another application piece to replace the test score, but most do not.
- Pay attention to scholarship requirements!
 - The test score might be competitive for admission, but prevent you from getting a higher scholarship that your GPA alone would have met!

FERPA?

- The colleges ask students to waive their FERPA rights to see their recommendation letters and forms
- Should mark <u>I waive my right</u> on the release form and on the college applications

Speaking of letters....

- "I asked Mr(s). X to write for me 2 months ago and it still shows as 'pending,' what should I do?"
 - Teachers/counselors see college deadlines make sure they are accurate in Naviance
 - Submission of the application is completely separate from the submission of the supporting documents
 - Everything just has to arrive on/before the deadline

Essays and more essays...

 Applying to Mizzou, MO State, STLCC, UMSL, Lindenwood, KU, Arkansas, Arizona State, etc...

NO ESSAY

- Main Common App essay required for around 75% of the schools using the Common App
- Supplemental essays can catch students off guard! Dig deep to know what is required.

What are the most important things to think about when they write their essays?

- Should sound like a 17-18 year old, not a 45 year old
- First-person, authentic voice
- Does not have to be a tragic or triumphant story, but it's ok if it is
- Reader should know more about the writer after finishing
- It should "sound like them"!

Is it important to visit campuses and/or meet with the reps?


- Less emphasize this year on "demonstrated interest" but might still be valuable
- If asked to write about why they are applying to that school, the more first-hand knowledge (versus research), the easier!
- Every website = marketing tool
- The rep visiting PCH/STL is most often the person reviewing your application and sometimes the one making decisions

How do we get/find scholarships?

- From the colleges:
 - Automatic scholarships admissions application
 - Competitive scholarships → supplemental application; interview
 - MEET DEADLINES!
- From external resources:
 - Naviance → "scholarship list"
 - National databases → websites, apps, Naviance
 - NO SEASON...ON-GOING DEADLINES!

- Need-based aid from:
 - Federal government
 - State government (MO)
 - Individual college
- FAFSA
- CSS Profile

FAFSA

- www.fafsa.gov
 - Use this site ONLY! Applying is FREE.
- Use the 4caster tool to determine potential aid
- Apply for your FSA ID now (<u>fsaid.ed.gov</u>)
 - Electronic signature for you and your student, so you will both need ID
- FAFSA will become available on October 1.
 - Use income information from 2017 to complete.

CSS Profile

- College Scholarship Service
- Utilized by several hundred private institutions.
- Use institutional methodology which differs from the calculation performed by the federal government.
- The CSS collects data and sends it directly to the college.

How does the A+ scholarship work?

- If your student meets all A+ requirements by May 10, their transcript will have a special stamp/seal.
- When the final transcript is sent to STLCC, they will initiate the process of getting the funds to cover the tuition.
- If a 4-year college offers an A+ scholarship, they might have an additional form/application to submit (ie MO State)

Dual Credit/AP Credit – Now What?

- Dual credit same course at UMSL is listed on your PCH transcript. They will not need for admissions review, but will need for matriculation/course placement. (Send in June only to the school attending!)
 - To see your credits earned, you have to log in to your UMSL account (eek!)
- AP credit can be listed as resume-type items, but official scores need only to be sent in June to the school attending.

Will the credits earned in high school work?

- If only we could know the answer...
- "College Credits Earned in High School" page on the PCH Counseling site provides the most in-depth explanation
- You're really just guessing if you don't know where you're attending, or haven't met with an advisor for your major at that school ☺

They Got In!!! Now What? ©

- Have conversations with financial aid offices
- Complete housing application
- Submit enrollment & housing deposits
 - Check the refund policy
- Compare offers and make final decision by May 1st
- Inform all other colleges of your choice and asked to be removed from the enrollment list
- Inquire about college course placement exams
- Register for a summer orientation
- Send final transcripts
 - PCH in May
 - Dual-credit (UMSL, MO Bap, MO State) in June

They are Denied...Now What 😊

- May be first time in their lives they have been told "no" about anything major
- Hard not to take personally
- Many tie their admissions decisions to their personal worth
- Talk through how they are feeling
- Explore and evaluate other options
- Much of the disappointment can be decreased if they have a fantastic plan B!

"I've already been admitted, so this year doesn't matter, right?"

- WRONG! I've told the seniors, but they might need reminders...
- Offers of admission are dependent upon final transcript
- Some ask for midyear transcript (or 6 week)
- Some re-evaluate GPA and ACT scores through the end of the year for admission and/or scholarships!

FINAL 2 FAQS

- "What are the most important things I need to ask my senior about doing now?"
 - Have they turned in their "green sheet" to request transcripts, and did they "waive their rights" to view their recommendations?
 - Do they have all of their colleges in the "colleges I'm applying to" section of Naviance?
 - Are their deadlines accurate in Naviance?
 - Have they submitted their transcripts?
 - If using Common App (CA)...
 - Is their CA account matched with their Naviance account?
 - Have they talked with a counselor about completing the CA school forms?
 - Have they invited the proper number of teachers to write for them (ask first, then invite in Naviance)?
 - Did they "waive their rights" to view their recommendations in CA?
 - Did they add all of their colleges in CA and preview all of the college-specific supplemental questions/essays?

FINAL 2 FAQS

- 2. "What are some things I can be doing to help?"
 - Make sure they know their SSN
 - Create FSA IDs (one for them, one for you)
 - Be prepared for fees (application fees, fees to send scores).
 Waivers available for families who qualify for meal benefits!
 - Keep them on track without doing everything for them
 - Build in time for bumps in the road!
 - Monitor their well-being
 - Help them find scholarships that are good for them to fill out
 - Encourage submission of the safety school application it really helps to start with an acceptance!!
 - Try to get them on campuses if you haven't already
