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Classroom Expectations

If you are doing individual work or small group work, you may have your phone out to assist you in research or to quietly listen to music. Do NOT have your phone out during a quiz, test, or exam. I reserve the right to ask you to put your phone away any time it becomes a disruption to your learning or the learning of others.
- 6. Respect yourself, your classmates, other staff members, guests, and the classroom.

Grading

Grades will be determined by adding the points you earn on projects, tests, quizzes, and homework and dividing them by the total number of points available.

Any percentage falling "between" grade levels will be modified according to class behavior, work completion, participation in class, and effort given throughout the semester. So, if you receive an 89.9, I will not necessarily give you an "A." Grades have to be **earned**.
