12/14*-12/22	Hanukkah - Jewish

1/1	Mary Mother of God - Christian (Holy Day of Obligation)
2/17	Lunar (Chinese) New Year - Confucian/Daoist/Buddhist
2/17-3/18	Ramadan # - Islam (may involve daytime fasting on the first day)
2/18	Ash Wednesday - Lent begins - Christian
3/2*-3/3	Purim - Jewish (may involve daytime fasting)
3/19-3/20	Eid al-Fitr # - Last day of Ramadan - Islam (no events, testing or major projects due)
3/21	Feast of Naw Ruz (Iranian New Year and Baha'i New Year)
4/1*- 4/9	Pesach (Passover) - Jewish (may involve daytime fasting)
4/2	Holy (Maundy) Thursday - Christian
4/3	Good Friday - Christian (no events)
5/24	Buddha Day (Visakha Puja/Vesak) # - Buddhist
4/5	Easter - Christian
4/12	Pascha (Easter) - Orthodox Christian
5/21*-5/23	Shavuot - Jewish
5/26-5/27	Eid al-Adha # - Islam (no events, testing or major projects due)
8/15	Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (Holy Day of Obligation)

Schools/teachers should avoid scheduling events, testing or major projects on these highlighted observances as they historically impact attendance at school and events. Note: Testing or major projects should be avoided the day after these observances as well.
