Let the Sun Shine In

his fall, Parkway began the largest solar panel installation in Missouri school history.

Barretts Elementary was the first Parkway school to install a solar panel system, but

before long all Parkway schools will be outfitted with a total of 3,267 solar panels. That number is enough to cover more than 30 tennis courts and provide 2.2 percent of the district's power.

In addition, each school building's solar system will be equipped with an online monitoring program that will be accessible via the school Intranet. Students and teachers will be able to view real-time data on their solar system's energy production - a potentially powerful teaching tool in Parkway classrooms.

Scott Phillips, a North High teacher, says science and math classes will use the solar project to compare energy sources and their effectiveness.

Parkway will pay \$72,300 per year to lease the solar panels from Brightergy, the company that installs the panels. The district estimates it will save \$1.4 million on its electric bill over the course of the 20-year solar project.

"It's a win-win," says Parkway School Board President Beth Feldman.

"This is our future," adds Parkway Superintendent Keith Marty.

arkway Central, North, South and West high schools all made it to Newsweek Magazine's rankings of America's Best High Schools this year.

In addition, Parkway Central High and Parkway West High received Silver Medals in U.S. News & World Report's fourth annual list of America's Best High Schools in May. Schools were analyzed at the state level, and the top schools were then analyzed nationally.





Yellow School Buses Go Green

arkway's yellow school buses are going green. The district has taken a big step toward transitioning its fleet of 150 school buses to use cleaner, healthier fuel from compressed natural gas (CNG).

CNG has fewer pollutants than the diesel fuel traditional school buses use. Parkway will purchase 30 new CNG buses and a fueling station with a \$1.5 million federal highway grant administered by the East West Gateway Council of Governments. The grant is included in the region's 2013-2016 Transportation Improvement Program.

Because CNG costs less than diesel fuel, Parkway will save an estimated \$100,00 per year with the CNG bus purchase, says Director of Transportation Will Rosa. The new buses should arrive sometime next school year.

Compostable Lunch Trays

In September, six Parkway schools discontinued the use of Styrofoam lunch trays, replacing them with environmentally friendly trays made of 100 percent recycled paper fibers at a facility in Indiana.

Craig, McKelvey and Ross elementary schools, Northeast Middle School and North High School introduced the new trays as part of a pilot grant project funded by the St. Louis Jefferson Solid Waste Management District.

This pilot will be accompanied with a commercial composting service. The service will allow tray and food-scrap disposal in separate yellow bins that will be transported to a local composting facility. The discarded trays and food scraps will then be composted into nutrient-rich soil.

ith his personal iPhone, this euphonium player is recording his own instrument in Paul Holzen's band class at Central Middle. He will listen to the audio after class so he can improve his playing. Other students use their iPads with digital metronome apps that help them tune their instruments or maintain steady tempos.

These are just some of the ways Holzen's students use their own personal electronic devices in class. Parkway began allowing Central Middle and North High students to bring their own personal devices to school as part of a pilot project this year.

Stay tuned for other creative uses of personal electronic devices. Holzen, by the way, is the same teacher whose military band, "Sidewinder," was invited to play at the White House this year.

Parkway Trims Budget Again

verall, the Parkway School District's budget is much stronger today thanks in part to last year's \$8 million in cuts. But in order to balance future budgets and restore reserve funds to the required levels, an additional modest reduction will be required. Based on current projections, Parkway needs to reduce an additional 1 to 2 percent from the operating budget beginning with the 2013-14 school year. This amounts to roughly \$2 to \$4 million.

To this end, Superintendent Marty recently asked administrators to brainstorm with staff members for possible reductions.

Once an initial draft of ideas is developed, it will be presented for review to a districtwide budget team of teachers, administrators and support staff. This group will study the ideas and make initial recommendations to the school board using Parkway's budget principles as a guide.

The initial recommendations will then be presented to the broader community for public input in early 2013.

After making any adjustments necessary based on community input, the school board will then vote on the final recommendations early next year. If approved, the reductions would begin with the 2013-14 school year.

Family Circle Magazine Ranks Ballwin as one of 'Best Towns for Families'


The quality schools in Parkway helped Ballwin, Missouri, rank as one of the best places in the nation to live.

Your School Bus is Watching

ittie Rice, a Parkway bus driver for 20 years, will have extra help in catching drivers who don't stop for school bus stop signs. This year, Parkway has installed state-of-the-art surveillance cameras on the left exterior of 12 of Parkway's 148 buses.

When drivers don't stop, the license plates are caught on camera and the video is sent to police who track down violators. "We want to make sure people stop for our kids," says Will Rosa, director of transportation. "It's important to let people know there are more eyes on the road."

"We think it's a good investment for student safety," Rosa says.

Last year, Rosa says the district turned in 55 stop arm violators; this year 15 violators have been caught. "I hope we eventually get to zero stop arm violators because that is the safest number for our kids."

Rice believes if people know they are being watched, they will pay more attention to the stop arms on buses.

Parkway parents also like the new surveillance cameras. Several told television news stations and newspapers they are confident the cameras will save lives.

Eight Parkway Students Receive Science Research Awards

ight Parkway aspiring scientists who spent several weeks this summer conducting intensive research with St. Louis-area professionals and professors are now reaping their rewards. The students have been named winners of the *LMI Aerospace/D3 Technologies Award for Excellence in Research*. Parkway students received eight of the 26 research awards – one-third of this year's awards.

During the six-week program, students are paired with top research mentors from the Donald Danforth Plant Science Center in Creve Coeur, Mo., Saint Louis University, Washington University in St. Louis, Solae and UMSL. To complete the program, each student must present a scholarly paper based on his or her research.

ast spring, two Northeast Middle students worked to end bullying at their school. In television interviews about the anti-bullying campaign, Joey Goldman and Meghan Mudd explained how they helped raise more than \$4,000 to bring the "Rachel's Challenge" program to their school.

Inspired by a student killed in the Columbine High School shootings, Rachel's Challenge aims to start a chain reaction of kindness and compassion.

This fall, Craig Elementary and other Parkway schools have taken up Rachel's Challenge.

Meanwhile, another Parkway school has been recognized nationally for outstanding character development.

In May, Ross Elementary was named a 2012

National School of Character. The first Parkway school to be so named, the designation comes from the Character Education Partnership in Washington, D.C.

Schools selected must demonstrate that their focus on character development has had a positive impact on academic achievement, student behavior and school climate.

Additionally, McKelvey Elementary was one of just 10 schools in the state to be $\,$ named a "2012 Missouri School of Character."

Ross, McKelvey and Pierremont also received the "Promising Practices" award for implementing successful educational initiatives.

King has been tutoring for close to seven years. She sometimes relies on Dr. Seuss quotes to motivate students. Her corner also displays favorite quotes and a photo of herself with students.


Phyllis Tirmenstein, a Parkway citizen,

donated \$5,000 through the Greater St. Louis Community Foundation to make King's Corner possible. Shenandoah Valley Principal Carrie Luttrell hand-picked most of the colorful furnishings for King's Corner.

Parkway OASIS tutors and administrators turned out for the dedication honoring King and unveiling King's Corner this fall.

After the dedication, other generous benefactors made contributions to King's Corner. As a result, more books and supplies will be purchased for King's Corner.

King and her corner are powerful reminders of the strength and success of Parkway OASIS, an intergenerational tutoring program.



Even before Parkway began requiring Algebra 1 for all incoming freshmen this year, Rachel Zang, a South High ninth grader, loved all things math. As an eighth grader, she often traveled to the South High classroom of Scott Degitz, an Algebra II/Trigonometry teacher and math club sponsor. Degitz would download questions from major math competitions for her and fax her answers back.

In eighth grade, Rachel entered a math competition for 10th graders, and then became the only Missouri student to qualify for the Junior United States of America Mathematical Olympiad.

This fall, Rachel won again, taking fifth place at the "Math Prize for Girls" at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. A Youth Prize of \$1,000 was also awarded to the highest-scoring contestant in ninth grade or below. Rachel and another contestant split the Youth Prize; each received \$500.

Rachel views Algebra as a way to "combine knowledge and figure things out. I like the logic involved." Parkway hopes to instill that same creative approach to Algebra in all ninth graders.

Five Parkway Students Ace ACT

Five Parkway students recently learned they each scored a 36 – the highest possible score – on the ACT college entrance exam.

The students are Bradley Gleason and Leela Chapman of South High; and Hannah Wiedner, Joy Yang and Henry Chen of Central High.

Nationally, while the actual number of students earning a composite score of 36 varies from year to year, less than one-tenth of 1 percent of students who take the ACT earn a top score of 36. Roughly 1.6 million students took the ACT exam.

The ACT consists of tests in English, mathematics, reading and science.



'Nicest Man' Bequeaths Life Insurance for Future North High Scholar-Athletes

Though Ted Matkin was never a school athlete, he has bequeathed his \$100,000 life insurance policy to future North scholar-athletes through the Parkway Alumni Association.

"Ted is a blessing to the Parkway North boys basketball program. I cannot remember him ever missing a game. He is also the nicest man anyone would ever want to meet," says North High Coach Russell Vincent.

The coach is referring to Ted's 13-year tenure as the official scorer for the boy's basketball program at North High.

Leaving his life insurance policy to scholar-athletes through the alumni association was not difficult, says Ted, a retired minister who has worked with young people all his life. His only stipulation is that the money be used for college-bound scholarathletes at North High.


If Ted hadn't chosen ministry, he says he might have become a music teacher because he loves music and young people.



North High's Marching Band Takes First Place

The North High marching band took first place in its division at the Washington Marching Band festival in October. North High's marching band competed in the field competition with seven other bands in class A, the large band category. North High, led by Band Director Mark Linn and Assistant Band Director Andrew LaRose, also had the highest overall score for all divisions out of 18 high school bands. The festival featured 35 schools and about 2,100 students in both the parade and field competitions.

New Science Renovation at West High



est High students are already enjoying the school's state-of-the-art science classrooms, above. For the first time this fall, they stepped into West High's newly renovated science wing.

Strong community support for the 2008 bond issue made this facility and a number of other renovations possible.

Each lab features showers and eye washes

At West High, each science lab is equipped with 12 computers, a SMART Board, a traveling media cart and safety features that include showers, eye washes and chemical and acid storage closets.

West High is the third Parkway high school to undergo major renovations to its aging science facilities.

Central and South High's new science additions, completed in the fall of 2010 and 2011, respectively, were the first and second.

The North High science wing was renovated seven years ago and only received funding for new equipment and technology in this 2008 bond issue.

Construction projects totaled \$15 million

The 2008 bond issue allowed Parkway to complete \$15 million of construction projects this year. These ranged from roof replacements to technology upgrades. As a result, nearly 90 percent of the projects from the 2008 bond issue are now completed.

Perfect Score for Parkway Again!

Parkway met all 14 accreditation standards measured by the state

Parkway once again earned a perfect score on its Annual Performance Report (APR) from the Missouri



Department of Elementary and Secondary Education.

Parkway met all 14 accreditation standards measured by the state for academic performance in 2011-12. Parkway has maintained full accreditation through the APR program every year since its inception in 2001.

To be fully accredited, a school district must meet at least nine of the 14 standards for academic performance. The APR is based on multiple measures of performance and student achievement such as scores on MAP tests, ACT college entrance exams, Advanced Placement (AP) tests, as well as graduation and attendance rates and other measures.


