## **GRADING SYSTEM**

The high school has a weighted grading system that went into effect in the fall of 1984. The weighted system is as follows:

Any course that carries a weighted grade is so designated. All honors courses are designated with the word "Honors" following the course title.

Selected courses offer an honors option, yet are not honors courses. This means an H grade is possible through contracting for the exceptional student. The last line in the course description indicates that an honors grade may be earned for courses that fit this category.

## GUIDELINES FOR IMPLEMENTING PARKWAY'S STANDARDS FOR A HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA

A planned four year program of twenty-four credits of credit is the minimum requirement for a diploma from a Parkway high school.\* It is also necessary to pass the United States and Missouri Constitution tests which are included in the required Government course.



# SCHEDULE PLANNING GUIDELINES

The Parkway School District's secondary schools offer a balanced program of required and elective subjects designed to prepare students to satisfy their personal and social needs as well as to meet the economic, civic, and social demands of the complex world today.

Some subjects are required of all students in the secondary schools. These are subjects that provide basic understandings, knowledge, skills, and attitudes that are the foundation of our social, civic, and economic life. These constitute the foundation of the broad educational program essential for all students.

The elective subjects provide opportunities for the exploration and development of new fields of interest and for the further development of special interests and abilities already discovered in the elementary school. The elective program, like the required program, contributes to the general education of students, enriching the educational experience and strengthening self-confidence and poise through satisfying academic achievement.

Sound guidance in planning a program of studies is essential in both the middle and high schools. Among the elective subjects, students should select those courses that will contribute most to the satisfaction of personal goals.

The secondary schools provide special sections of some classes for the purpose of adjusting the program to the ability and interest of students. Students are assigned to these classes on the basis of examination, previous records, and staff recommendations. Teachers and counselors are available to help students plan their programs. Parents are always welcome to visit the school and discuss program planning.

NOTE: Be advised that the courses listed in this Guide are offered on the basis of sufficient enrollment.

## **INFORMATION FOR ATHLETES**

Students may register at any time, but we recommend that they register during their sophomore year.

- All NCAA (National College Athletic Association) Division 1 and 2 athletes must register at <u>www.eligibilitycenter.org</u>. The NCAA Eligibility Center will evaluate a student's academic credentials once the following information has been received, and the student has had his/her status requested by an NCAA member institution:
  - Completed online registration
  - Fee payment
  - SAT and/or ACT test score on file from the respective testing agency
  - Transcript(s) from all schools or programs attended
  - All NAIA (National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics) athletes must register at <u>www.playnaia.org</u>.



## **PARKWAY SOUTH HIGH SCHOOL** A+PROGRAM



The A+ Program was started by the Outstanding Schools Act of 1993 as an incentive for improving Missouri's high schools.

#### Students who meet or exceed these requirements may be eligible to attend a Missouri public

community college or vocational/technical school tuition-free. A student is eligible to access the funds up to 48 months from high school graduation. Other Missouri post-secondary institutes do not participate in the A+ schools program but may also offer financial incentives. Please contact individual colleges/universities for more information.

#### Goals of the A+ Program:

- All students graduate high school.
- All students complete high school studies that are challenging and that have identified learner expectations.
- All students proceed from high school to college, post-secondary vocational/technical school, or a high-wage iob.

#### Participating High Schools are encouraged to:

- Reduce the dropout rate
- Raise academic expectations by eliminating general track courses
- Provide career pathways for all students
- Work closely with business and educational leaders to better prepare students for their lives after graduation

#### **Student Eligibility:**

- Enter into a written agreement with Parkway South High School prior to graduation
- Be a U.S. citizen or permanent resident •
- Attend an A+ designated high school for three consecutive years immediately prior to graduation
- Graduate with an overall GPA of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale (grades 9-12) (unweighted) •
- Have an overall attendance rate of 95% or higher (grades 9-12) •
- Perform and document 50 hours of unpaid, district supervised tutoring/mentoring
- Maintain a record of good citizenship and avoid the unlawful use of drugs and alcohol •
- Make a good faith effort to secure federal aid by completing the Free Application for Federal Student . Aid (FAFSA)
- Register with the Selective Service (males only)
- Score of proficient or advanced on the Algebra I EOC or a higher-level mathematics EOC approved by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education OR receive an eligible Math ACT score on a sliding scale according to GPA as determined by DESE.

To retain this eligibility after high school graduation, students must enroll and attend on a full-time basis a Missouri public community college or public career/technical school, AND maintain a grade point average of 2.5 or higher on a 4.0 scale.

\*Tuition reimbursement is contingent upon availability of state funds. All individuals required to register with the Selective Service must do so to be eligible for state-supported scholarships and programs for financial assistance for post-secondary education. Students must fill out the FAFSA no earlier than January of senior year in order to be eligible for A+ funding at the post-secondary institution. The financial incentives of the A+ Schools Program are dependent upon state appropriations from the Missouri General Assembly. The incentives are not the funding responsibility of the Parkway School District. Student financial incentives may be accessed over a 48 month period after graduation and contingent upon legislative approval.
