Parkway Summer School Information

The Parkway summer school program provides the opportunity to maintain skills learned in the previous school year and learn new ones.

The Parkway School District receives reimbursement from the state of Missouri for every day students attend summer school. Students are encouraged to enroll in the Parkway summer school program and attend every day.

High School students: Regular attendance is required for course credit. Students who miss MORE THAN two (2) course classes, regardless of whether excused/unexcused or due to suspension, will be dropped from the class and not earn credit. Students can not earn Honors credit in summer school. No pass/fail or audit credit will be given.

Summer school students are expected to follow all school, classroom and bus expectations, as well as the standards in Policy JK.BP, "Student Discipline." Disciplinary consequences for violating these expectations and/or Parkway's discipline policy may impact a student's opportunity to attend summer school and/or, as noted above, earn credit during summer school. Each day of a suspension is considered a day absent under the summer school attendance policy.

Parkway Summer Calendar

Classes begin June 5 and end according to the schedule noted at each site. Classes do not meet on July 3 and July 4. Refer to individual programs for more information on schedules.

Summer School Registration – Now Online!

Registration for Parkway residents begins at 8 a.m. on Thursday, April 6. See page 4 for details.

This year for the first time, elementary and middle school students should register online through the Parkway-Rockwood Community Ed online registration system at www.prcommunityed.org. High school registration also is online; however, the district is using a Parkway-created Google form.

Online registrations must be completed by Parkway parents. When the registration is complete, a confirmation will be sent to the email address provided. Elementary and middle-school students are encouraged to register online by May 24.

Parkway residents whose children do not attend Parkway Schools during the regular school year will need to bring two proofs of parent's or guardian's residency at the time of registration. These documents should contain the parent's/guardian's name and address, and must be:

- A deed/sales contract of residence, current real estate tax receipt or contract to lease/rent, AND
- One other proof of residency, such as a current unpaid utility bill, credit card statement, employer's record of address, bank statement, or governmental acknowledgment of address (i.e., Social Security, welfare, voter registration, etc.)

Kindergarten: Children registering for kindergarten must be 5 years old by Aug. 1, 2017. A birth certificate must be on file with the Parkway School District.

Special Education and Related Services/ESY

Services, accommodations, and settings are ESY IEP decisions and may include transportation as a related service. Contact your child's IEP chairperson or SSD area coordinator for more information.



Creating an Account on the Parkway-Rockwood Community Ed Online Registration System

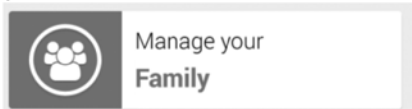
This year, for the first time Parkway Summer School registration for elementary and middle school students will take place online via the Parkway-Rockwood Community Ed online registration system.

You will need to have an account on the Parkway-Rockwood Community Ed online registration system in order to register for Parkway Summer School:


- If you already have an account, you're all set! Visit www.prcommunityed.org to register.
- If you **do not** already have an account, account set up is quick and easy. See below for a step-by-step guide to creating an account and registering your child.

Create your Account

1. Access the online registration site by visiting www.prcommunityed.org and clicking on 'Register Online.'
2. Once on the registration site, select  (top, right corner).
3. Complete the *Register a New Account* Form and select 'Create Account'. 
4. Once complete, the system will redirect you to a Welcome screen within 15 seconds of setting up your profile.
5. It is recommended that prior to beginning registration you add all family members, including your children, to your account. From the Welcome screen, select 'Manage your Family'



Use the  button to add family members.

Complete the 'Add a New Person' form and select the  button.

6. After entering each family member/relationship, you will be redirected back to the Welcome screen. You can continue to select 'Manage Relationships' to add additional family members/relationships as needed.

Once you have completed adding all family members/relationships to your account, you are now ready to register!

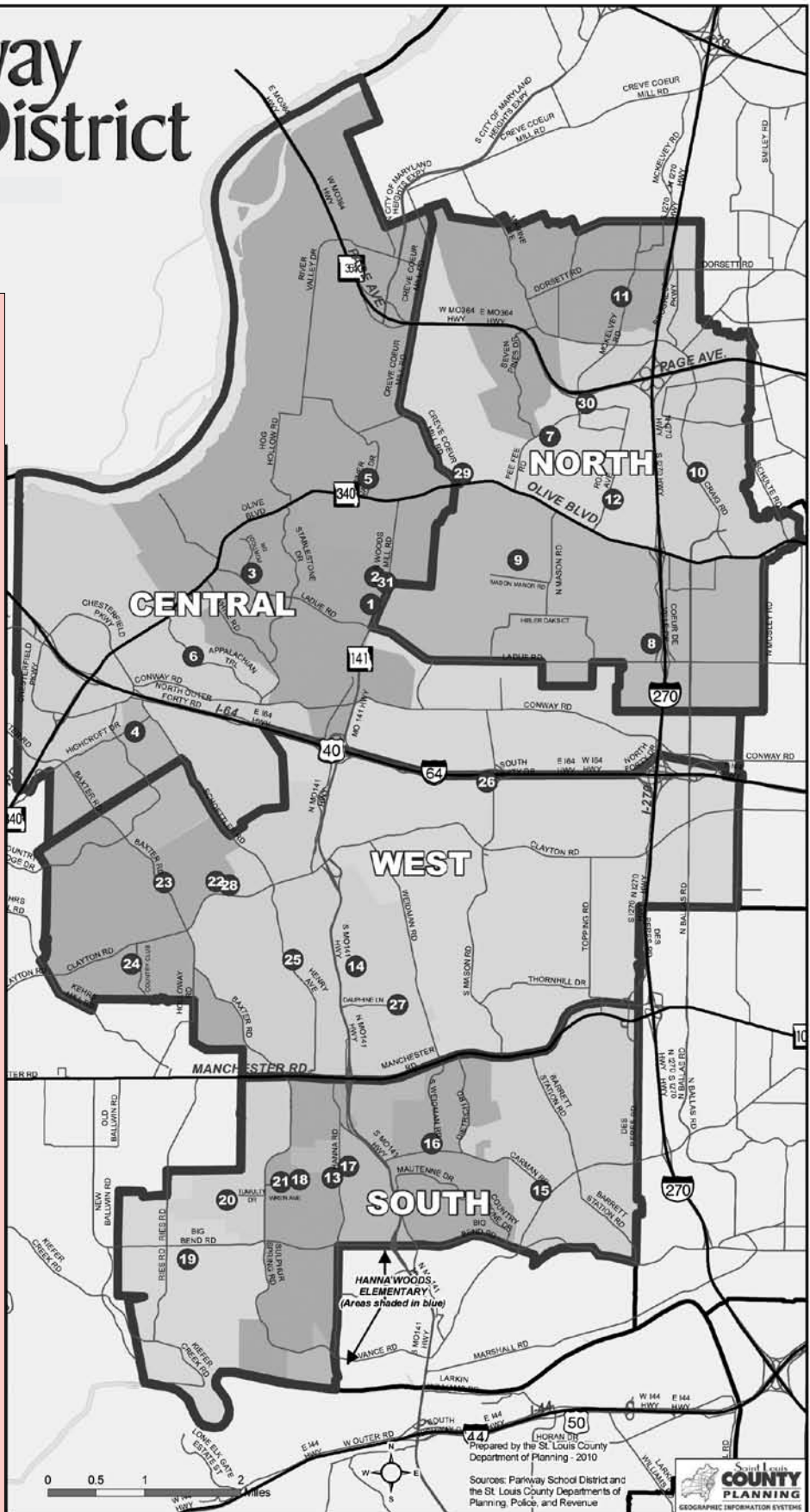

North Area High School

Program Description

North High's summer program will be held at Northeast Middle. The program provides courses that may be taken to earn credit for courses that were not successfully completed during the school year, and a variety of elective and enrichment courses which will assist each student in achieving optimal individual growth.

Attendance and Grades

Regular attendance is required for course credit. A third absence will result in loss of credit and the student will be dropped from the class. Chronic tardiness may also be recorded as an absence. All students will receive a grade in every class. Students cannot earn Honors credit in summer school. No pass/fails or audit credit will be given.

Registration

Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on April 6, summer school registration for high-school students will be conducted online at www.pkwy.info/SummerLearning2017.

If, at 11:59 p.m. on April 8, any class has received more registrations than spaces available, a random selection will be held for the spaces in the class. Students/parents will be notified if they were not selected for a class that requires a random selection. Starting at 12 a.m. on April 9 enrollment will be processed on a first-come, first served basis. If a course no longer appears in a school's drop-down menu it is filled/closed.

Computers will be available at North High School between 8 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. on April 6 for anyone, who does not have computer access. If you need additional assistance with electronic registration, call the summer school office listed above

Fees

Students pay no tuition or supply fees.

Transportation

Bus transportation is provided for Parkway residents from North area elementary schools to Northeast Middle.

The following courses are offered only to those students who have previously attempted the course, but did not earn credit. Only 1/2 credit (one semester) may be earned during summer school for any course—even if it is a year-long course during the school year (Periods are subject to change based on student requests and enrollment).

English 1 English #057010 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit
The ninth grade English program consists of studying various forms of literature and composition, including mechanics and usage, vocabulary, spelling and oral communication. These skills are expanded through the study of the short story, the novel, poetry and drama.

English 2 English #057020 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit
Continues the work begun in English 1 with the study of literature, composition and oral communication skills. The skills of analysis and critical reading are developed through poetry, fiction, nonfiction and drama.

English 3 English #057030 Grade 12 1/2 credit
This is a course to survey American literature, including all genres and a variety of reading materials. Students also write in response to the ideas and issues in the literature. The summer course will review parts of literature to 1900 (from the Fall course) and review literature from 1900 to the present (from the Spring course).

Modern United States History Social Studies #157000 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit
This continuation of a two-year study of American history, begun in the eighth grade, includes the study of domestic and foreign events which brought the United States to world power in the 1900's, the world wars and the changing role of the United States in the post-war era.

World History: The Modern Era Social Studies #157010 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit
This course traces the development of western civilization from its classical origins to the twentieth century by concentrating on specific periods, persons and events. This course includes comparisons of past and present events, as well as western and non-western development.

United States Government Social Studies #157100 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit
The history, institutions, branches, functions, electoral processes, and citizens' role associated with the governments of the local area, the state of Missouri, and the United States are presented in this course. The course includes an emphasis on the rights, and responsibilities of citizenship (e.g., community service), as well as a study of the principles and provisions of the Missouri and United States Constitutions. The Constitution examination(s) and the course must be passed according to Missouri law in order for a student to receive a graduation certificate.

Algebra 1 Math #117100 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit
Algebra 1 in summer school is for remediation for the Algebraic Standards. The Standards that will be presented in this course are Writing Equations, Systems of Equations, Systems of Inequalities and Solving Quadratics. All students enrolled will be responsible for learning and assessing on these standards. At the conclusion of this course, students take the Algebra 1 End of Course Assessment required by the state of Missouri.

Algebra 2 Math #117300 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit
This course reviews fundamental concepts and skills of high school algebra and applies them to typical topics of second-year algebra. The content stresses manipulation of algebraic expressions, solution of algebraic statements, and classification of algebraic relations.

Geometry Math #117200 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit
This course covers the traditional content of high school geometry and introduces the student to geometric proof. The emphasis of the course is on geometric relationship of figures, visualization of geometric properties and mensuration formulae.

Matter and Change Science #137210 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit
This semester of chemistry will include a study of physical and chemical changes, classification of matter, phase changes, atomic structure, the periodic table, laws of conservation of matter, as well as the history of chemistry. The course also addresses scientific method, graphing and metric measurement.

Biology 1: Cells and Variation Science #137140 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit

This course of life science looks at scientific methods, human anatomy and physiology, cells and their environment, some aspects of cell division, biochemistry and disease. The topics will be addressed in a manner that emphasizes process and thinking skills.

Biology 2: Evolution & Ecology Science #137150 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit

The theme for Biology 2 is How is life interrelated? Students will study the unity and diversity of life, natural selection, DNA, protein synthesis, interdependence, ecological processes, photosynthesis, and respiration.

Forces and Motion in 1D Science #137310 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit

This semester course is the first in a recommended series of physics courses, and will cover topics including laboratory safety, measurement, scientific inquiry, graphical analysis and the study of forces and motion in one dimension. Group interaction, discussion, and cooperation during laboratory practice and mathematical problem-solving sessions will be commonplace. Open-ended lab experiences requiring student collaboration and multiple-step problem-solving execution will be frequent.

The following courses are offered to any student wishing to earn elective credit (without having previously taken the course), as well as to those who have previously taken the course, but did not earn credit. Each course earns 1/2 credit. These courses are offered only to those students entering the grades indicated (Periods are subject to change based on student requests and enrollment.)

College Prep Composition 1 English #057210 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit

This course is equivalent to and preparation for college Freshman Composition. This course will help students develop skills in writing personal narratives, conducting field research, and composing reflective writing. In composing their essays, students will apply the writing process, including drafting, revising, peer editing, and engaging in conferences with the teacher. Students will receive instruction in vocabulary, mechanics and grammar, which they will apply to their writing.

Creative Writing English #057130 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit

The goal of this course is to encourage and nurture the student's innate creativity. Students will study techniques used by professional writers and will be motivated with enticing writing activities designed to help them improve their skills while experiencing the pleasure of success. Writing may include a play, a short story, plus many poems and personal narratives. The exhibition of students' work produced in this class will be in the school's creative writing magazine. May not replace English 3.

Advanced English Prep Elective #057222 Grades 9-10 1/2 credit

Advanced English Prep helps bridge the gap between middle-school language arts and the high school Advanced English program. The course will include practice in close reading and annotation of fiction texts, analytical literary discussion, and paragraph structure with a close focus on literary analysis, grammar/usage reinforcement, and vocabulary work. Time will be given for work on the summer reading assignment due in the fall.

ELL Essentials Elective #52951 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This course is designed for students who have limited English proficiency. Emphasis is placed on acquiring skills in listening, reading, speaking and writing. This intensive instruction in a supportive and non-threatening environment, helps students learn English quickly and allows ELLs to make necessary academic and social adjustments.

Exploring Human Behavior Elective #961500 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This introductory course explores themes of motivation, depression, personality disorders, and other topics relating to becoming a self-actualized person. This is an enrichment course, and therefore students should expect to complete all homework in order to be successful.

Hollywood History Elective #961300 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

Ever since Birth of a Nation, Hollywood has created its own version of history. Since then, some films have had enormous educational value, while others are created purely for entertainment purposes. How can the average viewer tell the difference? This class will give students the opportunity to view films from a variety of historical periods and assess their historical accuracy against a wide range of other sources.

Prep Algebra Elective #116050 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This course is designed to introduce students to the basic algebraic properties, vocabulary, and concepts. It will prepare students for success in Algebra 1 during the coming year. Students who have failed a semester of Algebra should not take this course.

Prep Geometry Elective #116070 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This course is designed to introduce students to the basic geometric properties, vocabulary, and concepts. It will prepare algebra students and/or incoming 9th graders for success in geometry during the coming year. Students who have failed a semester of geometry should not take this course. This course will fulfill an elective credit.

Psychology in the Media Elective #961400 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This class will examine how psychology is portrayed in the news, TV shows (sitcoms, dramas, etc.) and in the movies (Beautiful Mind, As Good as it Gets, etc.). Students will gain an understanding and examine facts and myths portrayed in the media, evaluate the authenticity of media portrayals, and compare and contrast media portrayals with a wide range of other sources.

Reading Strategies Elective #961003 Grades 9-10 1/2 credit

Reading enrichment will give students of all reading abilities an opportunity to improve their general reading skills. Students will work with a variety of texts including novels, short stories, newspapers, magazines, textbooks, film, and on-line sources. Vocabulary instruction and writing assignments will enhance the reading strategies, and a variety of study skill strategies will also be explored.

Robotics Technology Elective #107680 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

The field of robotics requires a working knowledge of electronics, mechanics and software. It is usually accompanied by a large working knowledge of many subjects. Focusing on mobile robots and using a hands-on, collaborative approach, students will be introduced to the basic concepts/systems, terminology, and programming involved in robotics. This course will be of specific interest to students interested in applications of electronics, computer science, and physics.

Strategies for School Success Elective #961000 Grades 9-10 1/2 credit

Get a head start on the next school year. Students will learn organizational skills and time management as well as note-taking and listening skills to make school and homework life more manageable. Step-by-step procedures for successful essay writing and test-taking techniques will be taught. Students will also brush up on their math skills to get them ready for the next school year.

Traffic Safety and Driver Education Elective #087350 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit

This course is designed to instruct an individual to drive according to the laws of the state of Missouri. Classroom instruction will emphasize overall traffic and driving problems, the psychology of the driver, traffic laws and preparation for the Missouri Driver's Examination, preventive maintenance, and fundamental safety and first aid instruction. The course will offer no behind-the-wheel driving instruction.

Writing Strategies Elective #961001 Grades 9-10 1/2 credit

This course is designed to help incoming freshmen and sophomores improve their writing skills and prepare for the rigorous language arts program. Students will learn strategies to help with pre-writing, organizing, drafting, revising, and publishing their papers. Students will work toward writing multi-paragraph essays with strong theses, clear organization and detailed development in their prose.

Design Arts Fine Arts #027000 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

Students will be taught how to use the elements and principles of design to create well designed works of art in a variety of art media, which may include drawing, painting, and sculpture. This course serves as a prerequisite for a number of art courses.

Piano 1 Fine Arts #127610 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This course is designed for beginning piano students. Students will become familiar with the keyboard and will learn to read notes and chord symbols.

Health Education Health #077100 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit

This comprehensive course includes the topics of body systems, social systems, personal and family health/human sexuality, nutrition principles and practices, consumer health, life-management skills, disease prevention and control, personal safety and injury prevention, tobacco, alcohol and other drugs, and environmental health.

Physical Fitness Concepts P.E. #087110 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

The content of the course involves personal physical fitness, aquatics and limited exposure to selected activities. Emphasis will be placed on assessing, achieving and maintaining personal, health-related physical-fitness goals. Only ½ required physical education credit can be earned in summer school.

Competitive Sports and Games P.E. #087140 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit

The course will focus on the skill development, knowledge of rules and strategies in a variety of team sports. Fitness and conditioning will play a major role in the application of this class. Only ½ required physical education credit can be earned in summer school.

Walking Fitness P.E. #087400 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit

This course incorporates creative-walking programs to improve student fitness levels and promote lifetime fitness. Various assessments will be used to develop students’ understanding in regards to the importance of their overall fitness, with an emphasis on cardiovascular fitness. Correct methods of walking, aerobic walking, exercise principles, and health and nutrition concepts will be addressed. Only ½ required physical education credit can be earned in summer school.

Personal Finance Personal Finance #037100 Grades 10-12 1/2 credit

Understanding and managing personal finances are key to one’s future financial success. This one-semester course is based on the Missouri Personal Finance Competencies and presents essential knowledge and skills to make informed decisions about real-world financial issues. Students will learn how choices influence occupational options and future earning potential. Students will also learn to apply decision-making skills to evaluate career choices and set personal goals. The course content is designed to help the learner make wise spending, saving, and credit decisions and to make effective use of income to achieve personal financial success.

Design Technology CTE #107121 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This course provides opportunities for students to explore technologies in communications, design engineering, power, energy and transportation. Students will explore the fundamentals of Computer Aided Design Software and its application in the design process. Students will develop the necessary skills in design and problem solving to enable them to undertake a variety of problem solving and design tasks.

Integrated Computer Literacy CTE #037010 Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This course helps students develop and apply computer skills in a variety of subject areas in - school, business and other professional environments by strengthening proficiency on the computer keyboard using current software to learn word processing, data base, spreadsheet, and desktop publishing.

Environmental Science Science #137500 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit

This course centers on the principles of ecology. Major concepts include: studies of soil, air and water, environmental variables, population dynamics, indicator organisms, succession, pathology of the environment, and energy.

College Admissions Elective #96180 or 961802 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit

Program Description

The Coalition of Essential Schools (CES), established in 1984 as a partnership between Brown University and selected secondary schools throughout the country, is devoted to strengthening student learning by helping schools reshape their priorities. South High and Maryville University have collaborated to develop a program based upon some of the Coalition's principles: Personalized teaching and learning; student-as-worker, teacher-as-coach; demonstration of mastery; less is more, depth over coverage.

Teachers strive to create an intellectually rich environment, which emphasizes active involvement in the learning process.

Fees

Students pay no tuition or supply fees unless otherwise specified.

Registration

Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on April 6, summer school registration for high-school students will be conducted online at www.pkwy.info/SummerLearning2017.

If, at 11:59 p.m. on April 8, any class has received more registrations than spaces available, a random selection will be held for the spaces in the class. Students/parents will be notified if they were not selected for a class that requires a random selection. Starting at 12:00 a.m. on April 9 enrollment will be processed on a first-come, first served basis. If a course no longer appears in a school's drop-down menu it is filled/closed.

Computers will be available at Southwest Middle starting at 8:00 a.m. on April 6, for anyone who does not have computer access. If you need additional assistance with electronic registration, call the summer school office listed above

An effort will be made to place students in their first choices, but alternative choices may be assigned. Notification of the student's summer school schedule will be mailed in May. Applicants may wish to consult their home school counselor before registering.

Transportation

Bus transportation is provided for Parkway residents from South area elementary schools to Southwest Middle. Buses will return to the elementary sites at the end of the school day.

Schedule

This is a five-week program, June 5 - July 7, Monday - Friday (no class July 3 and July 4).

Attendance

The Summer Academy is a five-week program. High school credit is earned only by being present and participating in class. A third absence in a class for any reason will result in loss of credit and automatic withdrawal from the class. Chronic tardiness may also be recorded as an absence.

Credit

Credit will be awarded and students will receive a grade for each class. In the Summer Academy, students cannot earn honors credit, pass/fail credit, or audited credit.

The following courses are offered only to those students who have previously attempted the course, but did not earn credit. Only 1/2 credit (one semester) may be earned during summer school for any course—even if it is a year-long course during the school year. These courses are offered only to those students entering the grades indicated.

English 1 English #057010 Grades 10-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

The ninth grade English program consists of studying various forms of literature and composition, including mechanics and usage. Reading comprehension and analytic skills are expanded through the study of the short story, the novel, poetry, and drama. One Shakespearean play is included along with modern and classical works. Writing skills move from strengthening the paragraph into careful building of a significant five-paragraph essay. Mechanics and usage, vocabulary, spelling, and oral communication are emphasized.

English 2 English #057020 Grades 11-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

The study of literature, composition, and oral communication skills forms the basis of this course, which continues the work begun in English I. The skills of analysis and critical reading are developed through poetry, fiction, nonfiction, and drama. The major emphasis in composition is on techniques and organization patterns of exposition. Creative writing and formal essays are covered. Special attention is given to problems of usage and mechanics, which persist in students' oral and written English. Improvement in vocabulary and independent reading is stressed.

English 3 English #057030 Grade 12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This course focuses on the variety of American themes and ideas presented in the novels, plays, essays, poetry and short stories of major American writers. Emphasis is placed on the understanding of literature and on the use of language, both oral and written, as a means of communication. The course further develops composition and rhetorical skills, research skills, critical thinking, vocabulary and study skills.

Modern U.S. History Social Studies #157000 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

Modern U.S. History includes the study of domestic and foreign events that brought the United States to world power in the 1900s, the world wars, and the changing role of the United States in the modern post-war era.

World History Social Studies #157010 Grades 11-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

Students will trace the development of world history from the Renaissance to the 21st century by concentrating on the specific periods, persons, and events of greatest significance to development. The course includes comparisons of past and present events as well as comparisons of western and non-western development in order that the students develop an understanding of the political, social, geographic and economic status of several nations in the world today.

Algebra 1 – Semester 1 Math #117101 Grades 10-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course will include problem solving and the traditional topics of high school algebra. The course will emphasize the communication of understanding of algebraic processes.

Algebra 1 – Semester 2 Math #117102 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is a continuation of semester 1 of Algebra 1. Students move beyond working simply with concrete objects and begin analyzing the abstract world of mathematical objects. This analysis requires exploration and imagination as students create, discover, and uncover unifying patterns and structures in the realm of mathematics. An improved understanding of these structures will enhance all students' ability to apply algebra to real-world contexts for predictions and inferences, thus helping them better understand and respond to the challenges of our ever-changing world. This college preparatory course emphasizes real number operations, the manipulation of algebraic expressions, and the solution of algebraic sentences. At the conclusion of this course, students take the Algebra 1 End of Course Assessment required by the state of Missouri.

Algebra 2 Math #117300 Grades 11-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course stresses manipulation of algebraic expressions, solution of algebraic statements, and classification of algebraic relations and functions.

Geometry B Math #116200 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

The content of this course is a traditional high school Euclidean geometry course with emphasis on formal geometric proof. Geometric properties and concepts in both the plane and three-dimensional spaces are covered.

Biology 1: Cells & Variation Science #137140 Grades 10-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This is the initial course in a sequence of biology courses that together will provide a college-preparatory experience in the life sciences. This course has the theme: What is the basis of life and how does it vary? Students will conduct controlled experiments using the experimental-design process. They will study biochemistry, prokaryotic and eukaryotic cells and cell environment, aspects of cell division, Mendelian genetics, meiosis, and the unity and diversity of life. The topics will be presented through numerous laboratory activities, lectures, and discussions; and will emphasize process and thinking skills.

Chemistry: Matter & Change Science #137210 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This semester course will include a study of physical and chemical changes, classification of matter, phase changes, atomic structure, the periodic table, laws of conservation of matter, and the history of chemistry. The course also addresses lab safety, the experimental process, graphing, and metric measurement. Group interaction, discussion, and cooperation during laboratory practice and mathematical problem-solving sessions will be commonplace. Open-ended laboratory experiences requiring student collaboration and multiple-step problem-solving execution will be frequent.

Forces and Motion in 1D Science #137310 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This semester course is the first in a recommended series of physics courses. This class will cover topics including laboratory safety, measurement, scientific inquiry, graphical analysis and the study of forces and motion in one dimension. Group interaction, discussion, and cooperation during laboratory practice and mathematical problem-solving sessions will be commonplace. Open-ended lab experiences requiring students' collaboration and multiple-step problem-solving execution will be frequent.

The following courses are offered to any student wishing to earn elective credit (without having previously taken the course), as well as to those who have previously taken the course, but did not earn credit. Each course earns 1/2 credit. These courses are offered only to those students entering the grades indicated.

Art Appreciation Fine Arts #027040 Grades 9-10 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

Art Appreciation offers visual and technical explorations in the fundamentals of art history and art production. Students will have opportunities to experiment with a wide variety of art media in addition to developing the skills necessary to analyze and interpret works of art. Art Appreciation provides a friendly foundation for future art courses, historical knowledge with technical skills.

Metalsmithing Fine Arts #960200 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

A study of art using metals, both flat and three-dimensional. The student will create objects through hammering and shaping the metal. They will use several different types of metals. A brief history of metalsmithing will be given. Emphasis will be placed on using the Elements of Art within the projects along with group discussions to assist students in critiquing their work and others.

Foods and Culture in St. Louis CTE #960400 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course will explore past and current immigrant groups in St. Louis, as well as their cultures and foods. Students will research an immigrant group in depth and present what they have learned to the rest of the class. The study of culinary knowledge and skills will be used to enhance understanding of various cultures and their traditional foods.

Intro to Business CTE #037350 Grades 9-10 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course will provide a solid foundation in business principles which are immediately applicable to students' lives. Through the use of interactive technology, presentations, and project management, students are made aware of the integral role that they play in today's every-changing global economy. The units presented are economics, entrepreneurship, marketing, and international business. The experiences students gain in this course will help them to succeed in future personal and business endeavors.

Health & Wellness Health #077100 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is required for all students and is generally taken during the sophomore year. This comprehensive course includes the topics of personal wellness, nutrition, safety and first aid, disease prevention, human sexuality and healthy relationships, substance abuse and prevention, and community and environmental health.

Physical Fitness Concepts P.E. #087110 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course involves participation in physical fitness activities. As a requirement of the course, each student will be responsible for developing a personal fitness plan. Only one required physical education ½ credit can be earned in summer school.

Walking Fitness P.E. #087400 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course incorporates creative-walking programs to improve student fitness levels and promote lifetime fitness. Various assessments will be used to develop students’ understanding in regards to the importance of their overall fitness, with an emphasis on cardiovascular fitness. Correct methods of walking, aerobic walking, exercise principles, and health and nutrition concepts will be addressed. Only one required physical education ½ credit can be earned in summer school.

Personal Finance Personal Finance #037100 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

Understanding and managing personal finances are key to future financial success. This one-semester course is based on the Missouri Personal Finance Competencies and presents essential knowledge and skills to make informed decisions about real-world financial issues. Students will learn how choices influence occupational options and future earning potential. Students will also learn to apply decision-making skills to evaluate career choices and set personal goals. The course content is designed to help the learner make wise spending, saving, and credit decisions and to make effective use of income to achieve personal financial success.

Crimes, Criminals & Corrections Elective #960700 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

The purpose of this course is for students to gain a comprehensive understanding of the adult and juvenile justice systems. Areas of focus will be theory of crime, the criminal justice system, law enforcement, law adjudication, and penology.

History vs. Hollywood Elective #960800 Grades 9-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course will look at the evolution of film as a means of social expression. We will examine the evolution of film as a historical art form, as well as certain genres of film that have endeared themselves to American society. In addition, we will investigate some “historical” films to determine if Hollywood got them “right.”

Strategies for School Success Elective #961000 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course focuses on learning proven strategies to increase student success and applying those strategies that work best for each individual student. Topics covered include, but are not limited to: organizational skills, time management, reading strategies, note taking, flashcard schema, memorization and how your brain works, critical thinking, scientific method, conducting and presenting research, ACT test practice and ACT test strategies, coping with test anxiety, and cooperative-learning skills.

College Admissions Elective #961800 or 961802 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit

This Parkway summer school class will help students prepare for the college-application experience and is offered at Maryville University. For additional course and registration information refer to page 49 in this brochure.

Program Description

The Parkway summer school program at West High School is designed to meet student needs by offering courses for credit recovery as well as enrichment. The summer program is designed to 1) help students retain and improve basic skills by retaking classes they have failed and 2) provide enrichment courses for high school graduation credit.

Fees

Students pay no tuition.

Attendance and Grades

Regular attendance is required for course credit. A third absence will result in loss of credit and the student will be dropped from the class.

Students receive a grade in every class. Chronic tardiness may also be recorded as an absence. Students can not earn Honors credit in Summer School. No pass/fails or audit credit will be given.

Registration

Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on April 6, summer school registration for high-school students will be conducted online at www.pkwy.info/SummerLearning2017.

If, at 11:59 p.m. on April 7th, any class has received more registrations than spaces available, a random selection will be held for the spaces in the class. Students will be notified by April 28 if they were not selected for a class that requires a random selection. Starting at 12:00 a.m. on April 8th enrollment will be processed on a first-come, first served basis. If a course no longer appears in a school's drop-down menu it is filled/closed.

Computers will be available at West and Central high schools between 8 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. on April 6 and 7 for anyone who does not have computer access. Please plan to access computers at the student's "home" high school. If you need additional assistance with electronic registration, call the summer school office listed above.

Students should meet with their counselors to discuss registration. Incoming freshmen or all other students not currently attending West High or Central High should meet with their home school counselors to discuss registration.

Transportation

Bus transportation is provided for Parkway students and residents from West and Central area elementary schools to West High. Buses will return to the elementary sites at the end of the school day.

Students in the VST program will be transported as during the regular school year. Students in the VST program will receive a notification card in the mail.

Transportation is not provided between period 1 and period 2.

The following courses are for students who have previously failed one semester of a year-long course or a single semester course (Periods are subject to change based on student requests and enrollment).

English 1 English #057010 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This English course consists of studying various forms of literature and composition, including mechanics and usage, vocabulary, spelling, and oral communication. These skills are expanded through the study of the short story, the novel, poetry, and drama.

English 2 English #057020 Grades 11-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

The study of literature, composition, and oral-communication skills forms the basis of this course, which continues the work begun in English I. The skills of analysis and critical reading are developed through poetry, fiction, nonfiction, and drama.

English 3 English #057030 Grade 12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course focuses on a variety of American literature and the use of language, both oral and written, as a means of communication. The course further develops composition and rhetorical skills, critical thinking, vocabulary, and study skills.

Modern United States History Social Studies #157000 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This course includes the study of domestic and foreign events which brought the U.S. to world power in the 1900's, the world wars, and the changing role of the U.S. in the modern post-war era.

World History Social Studies #157010 Grades 11-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course includes comparisons of past and present events as well as comparisons of western and non-western development so the students will have an understanding of the political, social, geographic and economic status of several nations in the world today.

Government Social Studies #157100 Grade 11-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course allows for a close examination of federal and state systems of organization. Students answer key questions concerning the U.S.'s social, political, and economic systems and their role as citizens. Both the Missouri and United States Constitution examinations and the course must be passed according to Missouri law in order for a student to receive a diploma.

NOTE: This course will be held at Northeast Middle only if West High does not receive sufficient enrollment. West/Central students who enroll in this course should enroll in a second class at that location (see pgs. 18-21) and will need to provide their own transportation.

Algebra 1 Math #117100 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course will review fundamental operations of real numbers with emphasis on the rational numbers. Students will learn the manipulation of algebraic expressions and the solution of algebraic sentences.

Geometry B Math #116200 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

The content of this course is a traditional high school Euclidean Geometry course with emphasis on formal geometric proof. Geometric properties and concepts in both the plane and 3-dimensional spaces are covered.

Algebra 2 Math #117300 Grades 11-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course stresses manipulation of algebraic expressions, solution of algebraic statements, and classification of algebraic relations and functions.

Chemistry: Matter and Change Science #137210 Grades 10-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course will include a study of physical and chemical changes, classification of matter, phase changes, atomic structure, the periodic table, laws of conservation of matter, and the history of chemistry. The course also addresses lab safety, the experimental process, graphing and metric measurement.

Physics: Forces and Motion Science #137310 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This is the first in the recommended series of Physics courses. This class will cover topics including laboratory safety, measurement, scientific inquiry, graphical analysis, and the study of forces and motion in one dimension.

Biology 1: Cells & Variation Science #137140 Grades 11-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

The first semester of biology has a theme of “What is the basis of life and how does it vary?” Students will conduct controlled experiments using the experimental design process. They will study biochemistry, cells, genetics, and the unity and diversity of life.

Biology 2: Evolution & Ecology Science #137150 Grades 11-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

The theme for Biology 2 is “How is life interrelated?” Students will study the unity and diversity of life, natural selection, DNA, protein synthesis, interdependence, ecological processes, photosynthesis, and respiration.

The following courses may be taken by any student in the designated grades (Periods are subject to change based on student requests and enrollment).

Creative Writing English #057130 Grades 10-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

Techniques of observation and the use of imagination are employed to add life to the individual’s writing. Short story and poetry writing skills are emphasized.

College Communication Arts English #057260 Grade 12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This course is designed for seniors who plan to attend college or a technical school after graduation from high school. The goals for the course are to improve reading comprehension of content-area textbooks; to increase vocabulary; to improve classroom skills; to improve writing skills; and to learn study skills.

Media in America Social Studies #157370 Grades 11-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course will examine the role of various types of media such as print, film, cinema, radio, television, newspapers, news magazines, campaign ads, and the internet in shaping American culture and history.

ESOL Elective #052951 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is designed for students who have limited English proficiency. Emphasis is placed on acquiring skills in listening, reading, speaking and writing. This intensive instruction in a supportive and non-threatening environment, helps students learn English quickly and allows ELLs to make necessary academic and social adjustments.

Honors English Prep 1 Elective #057222 Grade 9 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

Advanced English Prep helps bridge the gap between middle-school language arts and the high-school Advanced English program. The course will include practice in close reading and annotation of fiction texts, analytical literary discussion, and paragraph structure with a close focus on literary analysis, grammar/usage reinforcement and vocabulary work. Time will be given for work on the summer reading assignment due in the fall.

Prep Algebra 1 Elective #116050 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is designed to introduce students to the basic algebraic properties, vocabulary, and concepts. It will prepare students for success in Algebra 1 during the coming year. Students who have failed a semester of Algebra should not take this course.

Prep Geometry Elective #116070 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is designed to introduce students to the basic geometric properties, vocabulary, and concepts. It will prepare Algebra students for success in Geometry during the coming year. Students who have failed a semester of Geometry should not take this course.

Prep Algebra 2 Elective #116060 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This course is designed for review of basic algebraic properties, vocabulary and concepts. It will prepare Geometry students for success in Algebra 2 during the coming year. Students who have failed a semester of Algebra 2 or Algebra 2/Trig should not take this course.

Reading Strategies Elective #961003 Grades 9-10 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

Students of all reading abilities will get an opportunity to improve their general reading skills. Students will work with a variety of texts including novels, short stories, newspapers, magazines, textbooks, film, and on-line resources. Vocabulary instructions and writing assignments will enhance the reading strategies, and a variety of study skill strategies will also be explored.

Environmental Science Science #137500 Grades 11-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This course centers on the principles of ecology. Major concepts include: studies of soil, air and water, environmental variables, population dynamics, indicator organisms, succession, pathology of the environment, and energy.

Construction Tech CTE #107500 Grades 9-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

Students will study the construction industry and methods used in construction. The major areas of investigation in the course are planning, designing and constructing the project. Installation of mechanical systems, electrical systems, plumbing systems, and other systems will be studied. Students interested in engineering, architecture, and building trades careers may find this course a great benefit. Students may be asked to purchase consumables.

Integrated Computer Literacy (Keyboarding) CTE #037010 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is designed to help students develop and apply computer skills in school, business, and other professional environments. The students will learn proper keyboarding techniques and formatting skills. Students who key less than 30 words per minute should enroll in this course.

Sports & Entertainment Marketing CTE #047700 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This introductory course is designed to help students to develop an understanding of the marketing concepts and theories that apply to the sports and entertainment industries. The topics this course covers are: the marketing functions, target marketing and segmentation, economics, event marketing, operations, channel management, promotions, as well as sports and entertainment marketing plans.

Personal Finance Personal Finance #037100 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is based on the Missouri Personal Finance Competencies and presents essential knowledge and skills to make informed decisions about real-world financial issues. The course content is designed to help students make wise spending, saving, and credit decisions and to make effective use of income to achieve personal financial success. (Optional: This course can be taken online— see page 50 for details.)

Robotics Technology CTE #107680 Grades 9-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

The field of robotics requires a working knowledge of electronics, mechanics, and software. Focusing on mobile robots and using a hands-on, collaborative approach, students will be introduced to the basic concepts/systems, terminology, and programming involved in robotics.

Ceramics Fine Arts #027200 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

Instruction is offered in the materials, techniques, equipment, and vocabulary of ceramic art, including pottery and other forms. Hand-built and wheel-thrown forms may both be taught. (Prerequisite: Design Arts or Drawing)

Design Arts Fine Arts #027000 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course provides students an opportunity to develop projects based on the knowledge, understanding, and application of the elements of art and principles of design. Students will experience the creative problem-solving process, learn technical skills in a variety of media and learn to verbally evaluate their work and the work of others.

Piano (Beginning) Fine Arts #127610 Grades 9-12 Period 1 1/2 credit

This course is designed for beginning piano students. Students will become familiar with the keyboard and will learn to read notes and chord symbols. Personal headphones with an adaptor are required.

Piano 2 Fine Arts #127620 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit

This course is designed for students who have had some previous piano experience. Simple scales and chords will be presented along with the study of piano literature from every period of music history. Personal headphones with an adaptor are required.

Health Health #077100 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit

This course is required for all students and is generally taken during the sophomore year. This comprehensive course includes the topics of personal wellness, nutrition, safety and first aid, disease prevention, human sexuality and healthy relationships, substance abuse and prevention, and community and environmental health. (Optional: This course can be taken online— see page 50 for details.)

Physical Fitness Concepts P.E. #087110 Grades 9-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit
 Students will participate in physical fitness activities, including an aquatic fitness unit and a variety of sport and lifetime recreational activities. Only one required physical education ½-credit can be earned in summer school.

Physical Fitness Concepts 2 P.E. #087120 Grades 10-12 Period 1 or 2 1/2 credit
 This course meets the requirements for the second, one-half credit of physical education or may be taken for elective credit. Class activities will assist in the development of speed, power, balance, agility, coordination, core strength, and reaction time. Only one required physical education ½ credit can be earned in summer school.

Strength and Conditioning P.E. #087200 Grades 10-12 Period 2 1/2 credit
 This course meets the requirements for the second, ½-credit of physical education or may be taken for elective credit. The content of the course includes safety procedures in the weight room, proper warm-up and cool-down methods, and weight-training techniques. Only one required physical education ½-credit can be earned in summer school.

College Admissions Elective #96180 or 961802 Grades 11-12 1/2 credit
 This class will help students prepare for the college-application experience and is offered at Maryville University. (see page 49 for more information)

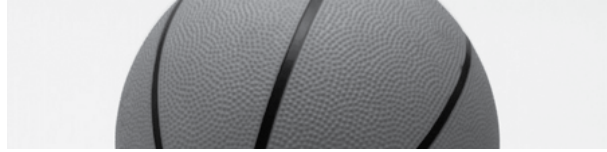
